





Kevin Costello

Kevin Costello, with degrees from the Chelsea School of Art London and from Goldsmiths College, University of London, has taught studio art and art history at San Francisco's Museum of Art and Academy of Art, and at Ringling College of Art & Design. He was art correspondent for the *Sarasota Herald-Tribune*, *West Coast Woman Magazine*, *Pelican Press* and *Sarasota Art Review*. Presently, Costello teaches art history for the School Board of Sarasota, Pierian Spring Academy and the Longboat Key Education Center.



Tom Cheetham

Richard Tarnas, Ph.D., is a professor of psychology and cultural history at the California Institute of Integral Studies in San Francisco, where he founded the graduate program in Philosophy, Cosmology and Consciousness. He taught at Pacifica Graduate Institute and served on the C. G. Jung Institute of San Francisco Board of Governors for six years. Tarnas is the author of *The Passion of the Western Mind* and *Cosmos and Psyche*.

Tom Cheetham, Ph.D., is the author of five books on the imagination in religion, psychology and the arts, and one book of poems. He is a Fellow of the Temenos Academy in London, adjunct professor of human ecology at the College of the Atlantic, and formerly associate professor of biology and environmental studies at Wilson College. Cheetham and his wife live on a homestead in rural Maine. He speaks and gives workshops regularly in Europe and the United States.

Jerry M. Ruhl, Ph.D., is a psychologist, teacher and author living in Houston, TX. Previously, he was a trustee of the C. G. Jung Society of Colorado. More recently, Ruhl served for six years as executive director of The Jung Center in Houston, TX. He currently maintains a private therapy practice in Houston and Boulder, CO. He lectures nationally.

Danielle Green, M.A., M.Div., Ph.D., is a licensed marriage and family therapist who studied at the Jung Institute in Zurich, Switzerland. Her expertise includes training in the fields of family therapy, hypnosis, neurofeedback, trauma, attachment disorders, mood disorders, psychodrama, Imago Relationship Therapy for couples and the Enneagram. Green's research interests include transgenerational family therapy, altered states of consciousness, and the interfacing of psychoanalysis and mysticism as a transformative experience.

Prometheus Unbound:
Exploring Art and Archetypes

Beneath the paint, beyond the viewer's gaze, is the artist's response to external (historical) and internal (psychological) events—the fulcrum of which gives art its spiritual force and tactile presence. This lecture will examine the latent cultural influence of the "artist" in society through Jungian psychology and the archetype of "Prometheus"—the hero stealing fire from the gods for the good of humanity. We will examine the paintings of Caravaggio, Rembrandt and Picasso in this context.

Sacred Spaces Ringling Museum Tour:
Myth and Devotion in Baroque and Rococo Art

The Ringling Museum's collection is a microcosm of 17th and 18th century European culture. In the history of art, these two centuries are referred to as the Baroque and Rococo periods. Classical literature and Christian texts dominate the subject matter of such art. This guided tour of the collection will illustrate Jung's insight into the nature of archetypes demonstrated in the theological and mythological subject matter in the museum's paintings. Our Moment in History: Is Modern Humanity
Undergoing a Rite of Passage?

On a global level, the past and the future are converging with extraordinary force. Old structures are cracking, the moment of creative chaos is upon us. What new principles, what new structures, will emerge to shape our future? This is much like what takes place on the individual level in initiatory rites of passage, in near-death experiences, in spiritual crises, and in critical stages of what Jung called the individuation process. Can we find grounding—an eye in the storm—from which we can engage this time of intense polarization and radical change?

The Gods at Play:
Archetypal Powers and Patterns in the Arts

The arts represent a vivid expression of the archetypal principles that inform and inspire the human psyche. This workshop will provide an interplay between entertainment and instruction, each enhancing and illuminating the other. The capacity to discern archetypes—the cultivation of what James Hillman called an "archetypal eye"—requires not only thinking, but also all one's faculties, one's whole being. Because the arts engage the many sides of the human sensibility, we will use works of art as windows into the archetypal character of different eras and individuals, and into archetypes themselves.

The Extensive Self:
Escaping the Trap of Yourself

This survey of the work of C. G. Jung, Henry Corbin and James Hillman will outline psychological, religious and political approaches to the use of the imagination for the purpose of expanding and deepening our sense of connection to our own inner lives, to those we love, to society and to the natural world. It also will invite us to consider the power of language to shape our lives and our experience at the deepest level and to open us to the poetry of the world. For each of these champions of liberation, the imagination is the fundamental ground of our humanity, and we will look at their varying approaches of freeing the human person from the prison of subjectivity.

The Freedom of Not Knowing: Imagination in
Art, Poetry and Everyday Life

Explore the visions of imagination in the works of Jung, Henry Corbin, Hillman's archetypal psychology, and in the work of modern and contemporary poets and visual artists. Discussion will focus on ways to use the differing meanings of imagination as it is understood in spiritual life, psychology, science, art and literature to expand and enrich our engagement with other people and with the world. We will come to understand creative imagination as the central force at the heart of reality. Then we suggest how a vision of the world in harmony with the alchemical imagination as articulated by Jung, Corbin and Hillman embraces the full range of human creativity.

Slender Threads: Invisible Patterns that Shape
and Guide Our Lives

Whether called fate, destiny or the hand of God, slender threads are at work bringing coherence and continuity to our lives and, over time, they weave a remarkable tapestry. Explore the roles of fate and destiny, as well as rational planning, in shaping contemporary life. What are these slender threads? Being in a particular place at just the right time, meeting someone who steers us in an unforeseen direction, the unexpected appearance of work, money or inspiration? Such patterns give meaning to our experiences, and once we recognize the power of the invisible threads we can stop worrying about trying to control everything. This gives life an intensity, a sense of safety, and it helps us to experience more contentment and happiness.

Physicists now claim what C. G. Jung learned from his explorations into the unconscious, while remaining true to his empirical rigor as a scientist: 95 percent of the world is invisible—and this hidden world is waiting to be identified and understood. This lecture will explore how we recognize this invisible reality as it moves through our psyche, determines our identities, impacts our relationships and influences our sense of being and our destiny. Through examining bursts of insight into the unconscious—which come to us through dreams, images, meditation and spontaneous visions—we will begin to understand how unseen realms shape our reality.

Maleficent

Presented by Urte Tuerpe, this fantasy is inspired by Walt Disney's animated film "Sleeping Beauty." Maleficent, a powerful fairy who lives in a magical forest, becomes involved in a conflicted relationship with the princess and king of a corrupt kingdom neighboring her realm. Betrayed by the king, Maleficent curses the princess and later helps her.
