

GALIN MCGOWAN, Ph.D., Jungian Analyst, is a diploma graduate of the C. G. Jung Institute, Zurich, Switzerland. She has been a practicing analyst for 15 years, assisting those called to the depth process of working with symbolic content of the unconscious. She provides supportive guidance to classical analysis, working with each individual's unique process of psychological development. Additionally, her practice includes the integration of biofeedback/neurofeedback, Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR), sand-tray and creative structure to support the psyche in transformation.

JAMES HOLLIS, Ph.D., is a Zurich-trained Jungian Analyst with a practice in Washington, D. C., where he also is Executive Director of the Jung Society of Washington. Dr. Hollis is the author of 14 books including: *The Eden Project: In Search of the Magical Other*, *Finding Meaning in the Second Half of Life*, *Why Good People Do Bad Things*, *What Matters Most: Living a More Considered Life*, and *Hauntings: Dispelling the Ghosts Who Run Our Lives*. He also has a new book forthcoming in 2018 titled *The Examined Life*.

CAROL S. PEARSON, Ph.D., D.Min., is the author of *Persephone Rising: Awakening the Heroine Within* (winner of a Nautilus Award Gold Medal), as well as *The Hero Within*, *Awakening the Heroes Within*, *The Hero and the Outlaw*, *The Transforming Leader*, and the *Pearson-Marr Archetype Indicator*. Her lecture and workshop will be informed by insights from these as well as from her forthcoming book, *America on the Couch: What Story Do You, Want Us, to Live*. She is the former Provost and then President of Pacifica Graduate Institute, and now an author and regular blogger for *Psychology Today*.

LIONEL CORBETT, Ph.D., trained in medicine and psychiatry in England and as a Jungian Analyst at the C. G. Jung Institute of Chicago. Dr. Corbett is a professor of depth psychology at Pacifica Graduate Institute, in Santa Barbara, CA, where he teaches depth psychology. He has authored numerous professional papers and four books: *Psyche and the Sacred*, *The Religious Function of the Psyche*, *The Sacred Cauldron: Psychotherapy as a Spiritual Practice*, and most recently, *The Soul in Anguish: Psychotherapeutic Approaches to Suffering*. He is the coeditor of: *Jung and Aging*; *Depth Psychology*, *Meditations in the Field*; and *Psychology at the Threshold*.

STEPHEN GILLUM has practiced meditation for more than 35 years, a calling that grew out of his initial training as a yoga instructor. His mentors included Swami Lakshmanjoo, then the world's leading authority on Kashmir Shaivism; Dr. V.G. Kulkarni, with whom he studied mantra and meditation; and Shunryu Suzuki and Edio Shimano, from whom he learned Zen meditation. He is certified to instruct mantric meditation, but has developed his own nontheistic style that fuses Eckhart Tolle, Zen and yoga with the focus on relaxing and observing the mind.

MARCIA BENDER has been a student and teacher of metaphysics for more than 50 years, and she has trained more than 400 students to read the Tarot for the purpose of self-guidance and understanding the human psyche. Marcia pursued her college education at Kent State and Youngstown State in Ohio during the 1960s; she started her career as an inner-city schoolteacher; and later hosted the Sarasota, FL-based cable television show "Metaphysics with Marcia" for 15 years.

Blessings from the Unconscious

In Jungian Analysis, much emphasis is given to how one approaches the unconscious as a means of healing, transformation and spiritual enhancement. In an analysis one comes face-to-face with the complex and archetypal content, which can be powerful and illuminating, and bring numinous blessings, but can also be destructive and overwhelming. This lecture will explore the process of analysis and the approach to the complex and archetypal content of the unconscious through the process of Association, Amplification, Active Imagination and Application.

Together we will weave theory and practice with archetypal content taken from mythological and contemporary sources to explore the steps of Association, Amplification, Active Imagination and Application. Given that mortality frames our journey, how might we live it more fully, not defined by fear, morbidity and denial? What attitudes and practices allow us to live more fully? And what psychological maturation brings us to experience this short pause as rich with meaning?

A SERIOUS MAN • Friday, December 8 • 1 p.m.–4 p.m.

Hosted by Mike Epperly, this 2009 dark comedy takes us into the world of Larry Gopnik, a Jewish physics professor at a 1960s university whose life crumbles both professionally and personally, leading him to questions about his faith. His wife is leaving him to marry a widower, his jobless brother has moved in; someone is trying to sabotage his chances for tenure; and his son is in debt to a marijuana dealer. Larry is a modern-day "Job," and themes include: faith, death, love, communication and, "Who has the answers?"

BABETTE'S FEAST • Friday, January 5 • 1 p.m.–4 p.m.

Hosted by Pete Grant, this 1987 Danish film centers on Protestant sisters Martine and Philippa, who grew to spinsterhood in rural 19th-century Denmark under the wrathful eye of their father, a strict pastor. A Parisian refugee named Babette arrives to serve as the family cook and housekeeper; 14 years later she wins a French lottery and plans a lavish celebratory banquet that tempts the family's congregation—which has been dwindling since their father's death—who abjure such earthly pleasures as fine foods and wines.

SOMETHING THE LORD MADE • Friday, February 16 • 1 p.m.–4 p.m.

Hosted by John Mutz, this 2004 film looks at the work of black cardiac pioneer Vivien Thomas and his complex 34-year partnership with white surgeon Alfred Blalock, the world famous "Blue Baby doctor" who pioneered modern heart surgery. In 1930, Blalock hired Thomas as a janitor at Vanderbilt University, but his dexterity and intellectual acumen landed him the role of research partner. Following a move to John Hopkins in 1943, they had to skirt a racist system that only allowed Blalock to receive the acclaim.

THE BIG CHILL • Friday, March 23 • 1 p.m.–4 p.m.

Hosted by Peter Mermin, this 1983 comedy-drama focuses on seven former college friends who gather for a weekend reunion following the funeral of a friend, Alex, who committed suicide. Each must confront the personal truths, sacrifices and betrayals that have left them disenchanting, as well as deal with unresolved issues they have with Alex, and with one another. Discussion will focus on the hero archetype and its relationship to social and political forces, and the relevance of the film to our current social and political situation.

INTO THE WEST • Friday, April 13 • 1 p.m.–4 p.m.

Hosted by Galin McGowan, this magical Irish film, released in 1992, is about two young boys living with their widowed, alcoholic father. Their difficult existence is uplifted by the arrival of their nomadic grandfather, who has brought with him a magical horse from legend—Tir na nÓg (meaning "Land of Eternal Youth" in Irish). When crooked cops discover the prized animal, they commandeer it, intending to sell it as a racing horse, but the boys resolve to rescue the mythical creature. They escape the poverty of a north Dublin council estate, and ride "Into the West" where they find that Tir na nÓg is not just a horse.
